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
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MSP To Host Seminar For Females Interested In Law Enforcement Careers

Fentanyl Headed To MD Recovered During I-95 Traffic Stop

(PERRYVILLE, MD) — During a traffic stop June 3rd on I-95 in Cecil County, Maryland State Police arrested a New York man and recovered heroin and a significant amount of fentanyl that the investigation indicates was destined for sale in Maryland.

The suspect is identified as Carlos F. De La Cruz, 33, of Bronx, NY. He is charged with importation of fentanyl into the state, possession with intent to distribute fentanyl, possession of a large amount of narcotic, possession of fentanyl, importation of heroin into the state, possession with intent to distribute heroin and possession of heroin.

De La Cruz was transported to the for the presence of drugs in the Cecil County Detention Center, where he was being held without

Based on indications of criminal activity, a K-9 drug detection team responded and the dog gave a positive alert vehicle.

A search of the car revealed hidden compartments operated by hydraulic pistons located in the seats for the driver and right front seat passenger.

From these compartments, troopers recovered a package of suspected fentanyl weighing more than 1,100 grams, with a street value of about \$150,000. A package weighing almost 17 grams of suspected heroin was also recov-

troopers developed information indicating the fentanyl and heroin were being transported from New York to Maryland for street sales. Assistance in the ongoing investigation is being provided by the Cecil County Drug Task Force.



Maryland State Police Arrest Two (Again) For **Copper Wire Thefts From Highway Light Poles**

(PIKESVILLE, MD) – Maryland State Police arrested two men early on May 27th in connection with the theft of copper wire from light poles along highways in Baltimore County.

The accused are identified as Joseph Wetzel, 45, and Mark Brunelle, 53, both of Brooklyn Maryland. Each are charged with four counts of felony theft, five counts of malicious destruction of property and one count of felony theft scheme \$25,000-\$100,000.

The arrests came following a months-long investigation into copper wire thefts from light poles around I-695.

According to a preliminary investigation, troopers from the Maryland State Police Golden Ring Barrack arrested the suspects around 4:20 a.m. May 27th, following a suspected theft of copper Police with the investigation. wire from a light pole at I-695 and Falls Road.

Wetzel and Brunelle were taken into custody at the scene without incident.

Further investigation connected the suspects to at least three other similar thefts along I-695 since



April. Investigators estimate the four suspected thefts caused \$66,000 in damage.

Troopers from the Maryland State Police Criminal Enforcement Division led the investigation. The Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration assisted Maryland State

Wetzel and Brunelle were charged in December 2019 with theft \$1,500-\$25,000, theft scheme \$1,500-\$25,000 and malicious destruction of property of more than \$1,000 for similar copper wire thefts from light poles and jersey walls in Prince George's County.

The total cost to replace the copper removed in that case was approximately \$400,000.

Another suspect, James Albert, 38, of Perryville, Maryland was charged with theft \$1,500-\$25,000, theft scheme \$1,500-\$25,000, malicious destruction of property of more than \$1,000 and possession of a controlled dangerous substance in connection with the December 2019 case.

Hundreds Of Citations Issued On Capital Beltway During Enforcement Initiative

(COLLEGE PARK, MD) – During a focused traffic safety enforcement initiative May 21 around the Capital Beltway, troopers issued almost 400 traffic citations and warnings for a variety of offenses, including speeds that reached 110 mph.

Throughout this initiative, troopers from the Forestville, College Park and Rockville barracks teamed up with troopers from the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division in a traffic safety initiative aimed at reducing crashes, speeding and aggressive driving on I-495.

Enforcement focused on both commercial and passenger vehicle drivers around the Beltway. Troopers issued 250 traffic citations, 144 warnings and 25 safety equipment repair orders during the

operation for a wide range of traffic offenses. Dozens of citations were issued for exceeding the posted speed limit for speeds ranging from 70-110 mph.

Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division troopers conducted safety inspections of 27 tractor trailers. Troopers placed six of those commercial vehicles out of service for various violations.

During the initiative, a citizen called the Rockville Barrack and reported a possible drunk driver in the area of I-495 and I-270. Troopers converged on the area and were able to locate the vehicle and get it stopped. The driver was arrested for impaired driving.

Troopers from the College Park

Barrack conducted a traffic stop and determined the vehicle had switched tags. Further investigation determined the driver was wanted on warrants for assault in both Baltimore and Prince George's counties.

Another traffic stop by College Park Barrack troopers resulted in an arrest after troopers found marijuana and dozens of suspected oxycodone pills.

Forestville Barrack troopers stopped a vehicle and determined the driver was wanted on a warrant for motor vehicle theft. He was immediately taken into custody.

Troopers will continue to conduct initiatives to address aggressive driving throughout the state in areas of concern for motorists.



Maryland State Police, Vehicle Theft Prevention **Council Offer Tips To Secure Vehicles**


(PIKESVILLE, MD) – The Maryland State Police, along with the Maryland Vehicle Theft Prevention Council, are reminding motorists to take simple steps to avoid having their vehicles stolen.

The warnings come as July is National Vehicle Theft Prevention Month. In Maryland, a car is stolen every 40 minutes, while one is stolen every 45 seconds in the United States.



Overall, 50 percent of the vehicles stolen had the keys inside the vehicle while 60 percent of the vehicles stolen were left unlocked. Also, more than 66 percent of vehicle thefts occur at night and 95 percent of the vehicles stolen had no anti-theft devices.

Nationally, more than 773,000 vehicles were stolen in the United States in 2017. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety



Administration, only about 59 per- vehicle. cent of all stolen motor vehicles are ever recovered. According to the FBI, the approximate cost of vehicles stolen in the United States in 2017 totaled \$6 billion.

Here are steps you can take to prevent motor vehicle theft:

- Close and lock all windows and doors when you park.
- Park in well-lit areas.
- Do not leave the area while your vehicle is running.
- Do not leave your keys in your

The Maryland General Assembly created the Vehicle Theft Prevention Council in 1994 as a statewide planning and dedicated funding resource.

The Council embraces a statewide strategy directed at public awareness, vehicle theft by juveniles, law enforcement and prosecution through a grant award process.
